- 2. The award is intended to recognize outstanding volunteer service to the Westerville community. The absence of personal or family benefit, any form of compensation, etc. is essential. As an example, a charitable organization may qualify for the award based on the community service it performs, but the paid director of that organization does not.
- 3. Other considerations are the number of people and/or organizations benefiting from a nominee's service, the length of the commitment to service, the significance of the nominee's achievements, and any obstacles that were overcome to provide the service.
- 4. Financial contributions are admirable, but are secondary to volunteer time and effort.
- 5. Public officials are eligible for the award, but only on the basis of volunteer achievement that exceeds the scope of their official responsibilities.

With exception of Item #4, no weighting of these factors is implied. The overall value of each nominee's community service is considered.
